

## SYLLABUS 6NT504 Greek 2

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a study of the basic morphology and syntax of New Testament Greek for students who have completed Greek 1 or who need an extensive review in the elements of the language.

### OBJECTIVE

The overall objective of this class is to gain an introductory knowledge of New Testament Greek, to the glory of God, and for the benefit of His church.

### REQUIREMENTS OF THE COURSE

1. *Reading Assignments*. You will be expected to read and study chapters from the textbook by William D. Mounce and any handouts distributed in class.
2. *Written Exercises*. You will be expected to complete a portion of the exercises in Mounce's workbook. You do not have to complete all of the exercises for a given chapter but you should complete a sample from each of the different sections. This work WILL BE GRADED ON A COMPLETED, NOT COMPLETED SCALE. You are only expected to complete approximately 30% of the workbook.
3. *Memorization*. You will be asked to memorize a significant amount of material this semester. ALL MEMORIZATION IN THE COURSE WILL BE CUMULATIVE. Note: since Greek 2 builds upon the elements of Greek 1, you are also responsible for the material studied in Greek 1.
4. *Quizzes*. A quiz will be given at the beginning of most classes. Your lowest two quiz scores (or missing quizzes) can be dropped from your grade. If you miss class or are significantly late, you will take a zero for the quiz. MAKE-UP quizzes are subject to the professor's discretion.
5. *Exams*. There will two exams: a midterm and a final. The format of these exams will be discussed as the semester proceeds.
